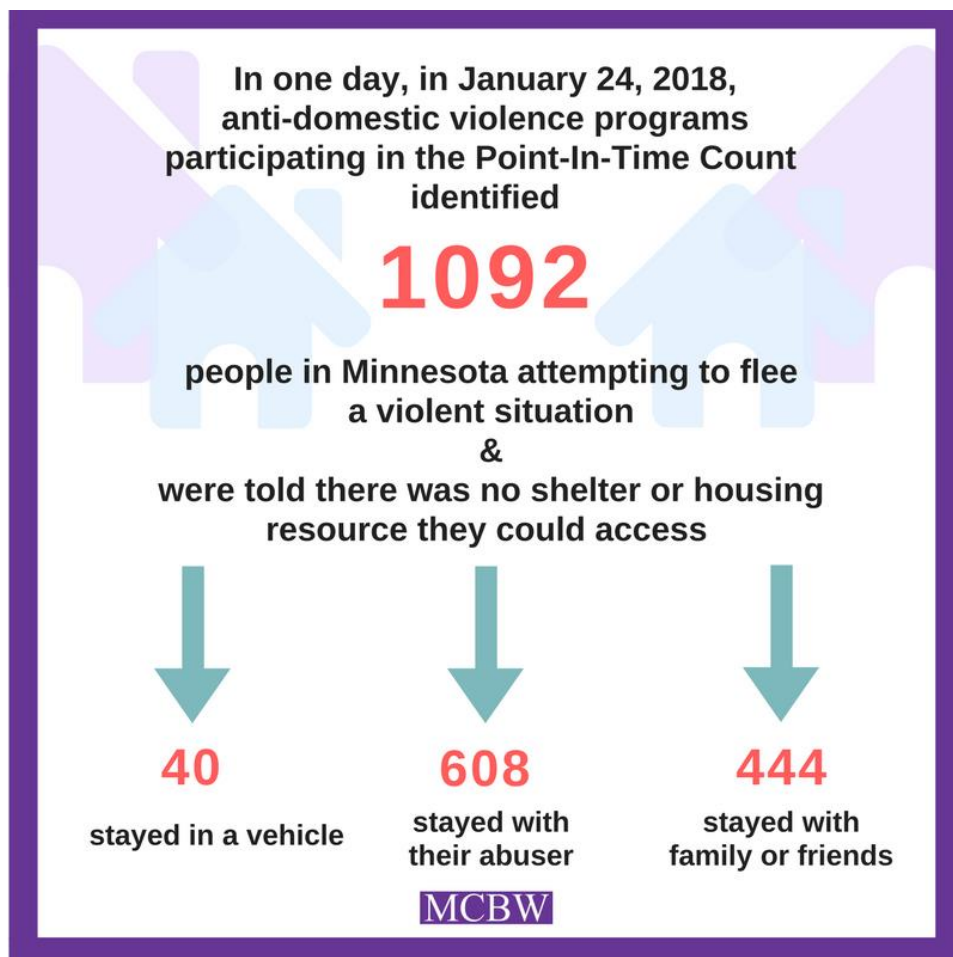


## 2018 MCBW Safe Housing Survey: Supplemental Homeless DV/SA Point In Time Count - Jan 24, 2018

The Minnesota Coalition for Battered Women (MCBW) is a statewide domestic violence coalition with 90 member programs. For the January 24, 2018 Point In Time (PIT) Count, MCBW partnered with the MN Office to Prevent and End Homeless (MN Interagency Council on Homeless) to administer a Supplemental PIT Count to count the number of people fleeing or attempting to flee domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking.

**56 member programs** participated, representing **80% of MCBW's direct service agencies<sup>i</sup>**, spanning across the **entire state**. We aggregated the numbers into a statewide total using HUD's extrapolation tool. **1092 people<sup>ii</sup> were counted that night as attempting to flee** domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking. These were people trapped at home with their abuser, doubled up, or sleeping in a vehicle.
