2020 Legislative Session Summary OFFICIAL SESSION CONCLUDED MAY 18, 2020





The regular 2020 legislative session came to a close on May 18th, with a long list of high-profile items that did not get finished. Some (but not all) of the major unresolved legislative priorities include:

- o A bonding bill (a measure to pay for a package of public construction projects);
- o Changes to tax law related to the likely COVID recession;
- o Additional COVID-response spending/oversight of federal coronavirus relief funds;
- o Housing and rental assistance:
- o Sexual Assault Kit testing/tracking;

Legislators expect to return to the Capitol by June 12, the deadline for Governor Walz to extend a peacetime state of emergency that has allowed him to make decisions to slow the spread of the coronavirus. Under state law, the governor must call legislators back if he renews the emergency.



Despite the shift in priorities due to COVID-19 and the partisan politics that came with the end of the legislative session, several bills did pass and have been signed by the Governor. Those include:

- o Stalking/harassment bill;
 - o This bill was drafted as a result of the Minnesota Supreme Court decisions that determined portions of Minnesota's harassment statute were unconstitutional because they prohibit some speech protected by the First Amendment.
 - o HF4137 makes several changes to remove the court's free speech objections
 - o Violence Free Minnesota testified in support of this bill several times and worked closely with legislators to ensure it's passage.
- o More than \$550 million allocated to address the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic in Minnesota:
- o \$26.5 million in funding for homeless service programs through the Emergency Services Program (ESP).
- o A ban on child marriages;
- o A bill directing the Department of Corrections to provide "a reasonable number" of free feminine hygiene products, including at a minimum sanitary napkins and tampons, to female inmates housed in state correctional facilities (part of public safety omnibus bill);
- o A bill to address access to affordable insulin for diabetics on both an emergency and long-term basis;
- o Raising the age to 21 to buy tobacco;
- o A bill requiring the Minnesota Peace Officers Standards and Training Board to create a model policy for eyewitness identification;
- o Becoming the first state to ban the use of the industrial solvent TCE for permitted facilities, with narrow exemptions, by June 1, 2022;
- o Acceptance of \$17 million in federal funds to help with election security and administration:
- o Establishment of new financial exploitation protections for older adults and vulnerable adults by expanding authority under the 2018 Safe Seniors Financial Protection Act; and
- o \$30 million to replenish the state's Disaster Assistance Contingency Account.

A handful of other bills have also been passed and sent to the Governor for signature.

Among those are the omnibus higher education, civil law, agriculture, and public safety bills and a bill to addresses school finance formula glitches resulting from the conversion to the distance learning model.

Negotiations will continue to take place in hopes that legislators can find agreement to pass the unresolved bills when they are called back for special session in June.

The state House has created a Select Committee on Minnesota's Pandemic Response and Rebuilding to continue conversations about the COVID-19 pandemic, even after wrapping up its regular legislative session. It will focus on responses to the pandemic and ways to rebuild. It will continue to meet on an "as-needed basis."
